### *History of the PT Shiploader*



The Doornekamp family purchased Picton Terminals in 2014 but Bethlehem Steel opened the site in the 1950's. Many thanks to [www.Marmorahistory.ca](http://www.Marmorahistory.ca) for an excellent summary of the creation of the Marmoraton Mine and the docks at Picton. Picton was chosen because of its strategic location and close proximity to a readily available employment pool from Prince Edward County. In 1953, the Peterborough Examiner announced "First iron ore wealth for the past eighty years poured into the holds of ore ships at the Picton Loading Dock".

The PT Times will celebrate the industrial history of the PT Shiploader in upcoming issues and at the Sept. 21, **2017 PT Open House.**

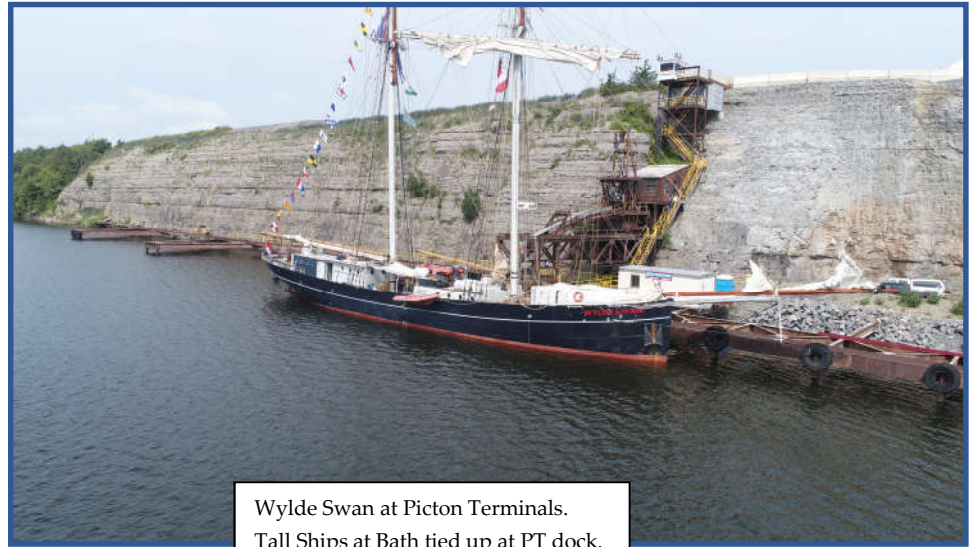


## RDV 2017 Bath Tall Ships PT Honoured to Support Tall Ships

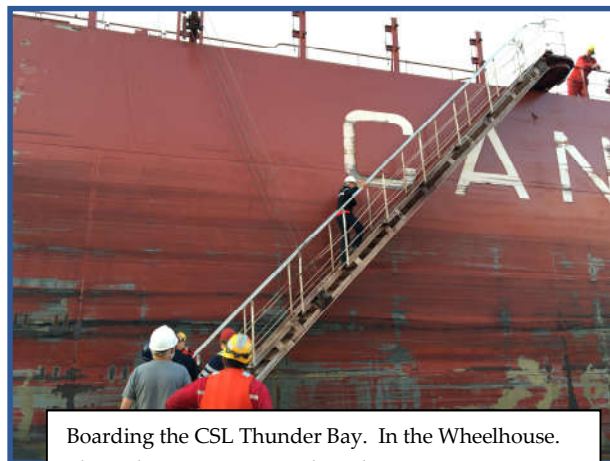
Tall ships will be sailing Canadian waters this summer to honour the 150th anniversary of Canadian Confederation. Eleven Tall Ships spent a well-attended
